From the Principal's Office

As I was driving home recently I saw a flashing sign near my house that said 'Rough Road Ahead – Use Caution'. I was somewhat surprised to see this sign as this road had always been smooth and well paved. But as we all know, due to the amount of snow and ice we have had this winter, many roads have taken a beating, becoming full of potholes and rough spots.

While I gazed at this flashing message it seemed to resonate with me on another level as well. It occurred to me that if we were to sum up the advice each of us would like to give our children as they grow up, would it not be something along these same lines: "Rough road ahead – use caution!" "Life can be bumpy. Be careful!" "Look both ways before crossing the street." "Proceed with care!" I am sure many of us would like to buy such a flashing sign and have it positioned near the front door for our children to see every day as they head out!

We want our children to be prepared to be able to navigate the challenges that lie ahead. While we do not want to instill a fear of life, we naturally feel responsible to try to give them the necessary tools they need to make the journey a safe and rewarding one.

The difficulty is that none of us knows what lies ahead. There is often no reliable map, no clear direction. Roads that were once smooth can suddenly become impassable. We cannot anticipate the twists and turns that our children will encounter on their journey through life. Each of our children must find his or her way, creating the map of their lives as they go, as the road unfolds before them; trusting to faith, experience and instinct as they decide which directions to take.

One of the things I love about Summit is that we care so much about helping our students grow into the people they are, so they can safely and meaningfully find their way in life. Our students come to us as children and over the three years they are here they strengthen their own foundation in what they believe and what they value. They gain enormously in knowledge and skills, in compassion and creativity. When they graduate Summit they are young men and women, and the experiences they have had here do help prepare them in meaningful ways for what lies ahead. As our amazing teachers and administrators practice their craft, they nurture, awaken and challenge the minds, spirits and imaginations of their students in ways that help them navigate any road, no matter how bumpy it may be.

But Summit is not just about preparing for the future; it is also very much about experiencing the present. As John Dewey wrote: "Education is not preparation for life, it is life itself." Each day at Summit unfolds on many levels simultaneously, like a multi-faceted diamond, reflecting back the light we all bring to it. There are lessons to learn and projects to complete, friendships to share and misunderstandings to resolve, secrets to pass on and laughter to share. These experiences make each day rich and meaningful in and of themselves, while also helping to provide a strong foundation for successfully being able to navigate what is down the road.

You know the old saying: "Each day is a gift, - that's why it's called the present." At Summit each day truly is a gift, for what takes place here and now, and for the promise of tomorrow embodied in the interrelated moments of our lives.

Let the road get rough. Let the detours take us directions we had not anticipated. Our kids will find their way.

High School Registration for 8th Graders

High school registration activities for 8th graders who plan to attend Boulder Valley School District high schools for 9th grade will be held during the month of February. This year, registration will occur at the high schools, and high school counselors will not be visiting middle schools for this purpose. Students and their parents will obtain registration materials at evening registration programs offered by each of the high schools.

Summit teachers will provide high school course placement recommendations to all 8th graders on Thursday, February 22nd. Students should bring their registration sheets and/or catalogs to school on this day.

The high schools listed below will be holding mandatory academic planning and course registration nights. If your student's high school is not listed, you will need to make an appointment with the counselor at the high school your student plans the registration process.

Boulder High School: 8th Grade Course Selection Night will be held on Wednesday, February 21st from 6:00 to 9:00 p.m. Students will receive registration materials and instructions for registering for courses on-line. Students with last names L through Z should attend from 6 to 7 p.m., and students with last names A-K should attend from 7:15 to 8:15 p.m.

Fairview High School: Evening of Transition and Registration will be held on Tuesday, Feb. 13th from 6:00 p.m. to 9:30 p.m. Students and parents will receive registration materials and be provided with instructions regarding course selection. Also, students and parents will have the opportunity to meet with teachers from different departments, and learn about extracurricular activities. The deadline for returning completed course registration forms to Fairview High is Friday, March 2.

Monarch High School: 8th Grade Registration Night will be held on Thursday, Feb. 22 from 6 to 8 p.m. Registration materials will be sent home to students but may also be available at Summit in the counseling office. The deadline for returning completed registration forms is Thursday, March 1.

Ms. Bartley will be meeting with Summit 8th graders in the mornings on February 13 and 14, to explain high school registration and course placement recommendations. In addition, she will be available to discuss high school concerns with parents during Summit's school conferences in the afternoons of February 13th and 14th.

September:

Zimbabwe Project

In November we supported the African project Nhimbe for Progress. This project in Zimbabwe runs a school for the children and supports Zimbabwean women. Mid-Year Progress Report 14 February 2007 On the Summit School Improvement Plan

Dear Summit Families:

As you may know, the Boulder Valley School District is responsible for assuring that all schools meet accreditation requirements. Summit, through the AAA Committee, participates in the BVSD District Accountability Committee TIES process (Tools of Inquiry for Equitable Schools). The process changed this year resulting in multiple shorter reports being provided to BVSD vs. an annual report that is submitted to BVSD and published for the school community. One of our new reports is a mid-year progress report to the school community, which is the purpose of this communication to you.

Each school sets Achievement, Equity, and Organization goals that are measured and reported on to the district. Summit is in its fifth year measuring these goals. Below are the goals and an explanation of how they are being monitored and tracked through the year.

Goal for <u>Achievement</u>: Students in the 7th and 8th grades will demonstrate at least one year's academic growth over the previous academic year.

We have completed an analysis of the 2006 CSAP data we do each Fall. We use this data to help us determine if each child and each class is achieving at least one year's growth in one year. The data show each grade is moving forward as expected.

Goals for Equity:

- 1. Fewer than 50% of the students entering Summit reading below grade level in grade 6 will still be reading below grade level at grade 8
- 2. The number of students scoring below Proficient in each cohort will decrease by at least 30% between grade 6 and grade 8

Reading/Writing – Our CSAP scores show that each class improved their Reading scores from year to year. For Writing, sixth graders improved their score by 45 points and seventh graders improved their score by 43 points. We will be reviewing this with staff. Also, our 6th grade Language Arts teacher has taken two days training in ESL and several teachers are working on a "differentiation" goal for professional development. Teachers are implementing their year-long plans for addressing these goals.

Math -- Our 6th, 7th, and 8th grade classes improved their CSAP scores over the previous year by 6, 16, and 22 points respectively.

Goal for <u>Organization</u>: Summit will enhance the quality of its school climate by increasing student, parent, and teacher sense of safety, by increasing staff and student awareness of bullying and of appropriate responses to bullying behaviors, and by decreasing the incidence of bullying behavior within the student community

We have completed our fall *StandUp!* Program, which focuses on creating a caring and safe community. All grades experience 4 hour-long classes on recognizing bullying, distinguishing between bullying and normal

conflict, *StandUp!* strategies for victims, interventions from bystanders, and developing empathy. The grade 7 and 8 curriculum also includes training on identifying sexual harassment. Another component for all grades is a bullying survey which seeks student input on their perceptions of safety, as well as likely "hot spots" where bullying may occur.

MAP Testing Update: Math and English departments used fall MAP scores and MAP "CSAP Proficiency Predictor" scales to identify students who are at risk of failing to meet "Proficiency" level on CSAP. Those students have been targeted for additional support (labs, office hours, etc.) In addition, the Science Content and Processes MAP test is being administered in February to grade 7 to assist with 8th grade placement, as well as to identify any students who are not meeting key Summit benchmarks (such as "Scientific Inquiry").
