#### The Principal's Column

#### 8th Grade Graduation, Friday, May 30, 2008, 1:00 p.m.

#### **Dear Summit Families:**

It is my pleasure to invite you to our upcoming 8th grade graduation ceremony! We are proud of the accomplishments of our graduating class and it is a pleasure to see what fine young men and women they have become during their years at Summit. Here are a few important points to remember about graduation:

- 1. Graduation will take place in the main auditorium at Boulder High School at 1:00 p.m. on Friday, May 30, 2008. Boulder High School is located at 1604 Arapahoe Avenue in Boulder.
- 2. Rehearsal begins at 10:30 a.m. All 8th grade students need to report directly to the main auditorium by 10:30 a.m. and attendance will be taken. We cannot begin the rehearsal until everyone is present so we ask that students please be seated by 10:30 a.m. After rehearsal lunch will be served and the class picture will be taken. 8th graders do not come to Summit on this day. They report directly to Boulder High at 10:30 a.m.
- 3. Students in 6th and 7th grades report to Summit at 8:00 a.m. and will be bused to the graduation at Boulder High School at 12:30 p.m.
- 4. Graduation begins at 1:00 p.m. sharp. Families should arrive early, as parking will be very tight. You can park on the streets to the north of Arapahoe Avenue as the two-hour time limit (for cars parked legally) will not be enforced. If you park illegally, however, you will of course run the risk of being ticketed.
- 5. Please enter and exit Boulder High School only through the main doors on Arapahoe Avenue.
- 6. 8th graders should arrive already dressed for graduation. Time will not be provided for students to change. Please help ensure that your child dresses in a manner that is appropriate for graduation. This means suits or slacks with dress shirts for boys, and dresses, or skirts with blouses, for girls. Overly flamboyant or revealing clothing is not allowed.
- Students should not bring extra "stuff" as possessions can get lost during graduation. Students should bring a
  water bottle.
- 8. Students, parents and guests are allowed only in the auditorium, social hall and hallway connecting these two rooms. Boulder High School prohibits people from wandering around their campus and we have been told that anyone found doing so will be considered to be trespassing. Restrooms will, of course, be open.
- 9. Order forms for a copy of the graduation photograph will be sent home a couple of weeks prior to graduation.
- 10. Ms. Koch and I will meet with all the 8th graders in early May to go over all the information they need for the graduation ceremony and to answer any questions they have.
- 11. There will be a reception after the graduation ceremony in the cafeteria at Boulder High School to which the family and friends of our graduates are invited.
- 12. All Summit students need to be picked up from Boulder High School by 3:00 p.m.

I look forward to sharing this most special moment with you as our 8th graders graduate from Summit.

#### Final exam schedule, 2008

Summit Middle School teaches an academically rigorous, standards-based curriculum. Students are expected not merely to spend a certain number of days in each classroom, but also to master particular skills and content. Systematic assessment of student progress, therefore, is central to the curriculum—teachers need to know how much of the course material students have learned and retained throughout each year of study. One of the main reasons Summit teachers plan "finals" (whether exams, projects, or writing assignments) for the last two weeks of each course is to determine the "exit status" of each child in the class.

To keep the student workload manageable, Summit teachers stagger their final activities over the course of a week. Our goal is to allow students to devote all (or almost all) of their homework time to preparing for one subject on the eve of the final.\* This is not to suggest, however, that "cramming" the night before is sufficient; students should begin their preparation well in advance of the actual "finals" day.

The finals schedule for 2008 is as follows:

\*Note: Some activities may take longer than one class period, so some "spillover" is inevitable. The goal, however, is that no additional studying or preparation should have to take place after the official "final" date.

#### Les Nouvelles de Français 2


